Today is the fifth Sunday of Lent.

Lent is a time of reflection, when we think about those things that keep us from following God's path of loving and caring for one another, and the world.

Today we extinguish our fifth Lenten candle. This candle represents envy – envy within us; envy that limits our capacity for gratitude; envy that keeps us from living with open-hearts and generous spirits.

As we move through this Lenten journey, may we remember that God's love and compassion are stronger than all the envy, pride and arrogance, fear, greed and anger in our world. Let us pray:

Holy God, you accept us for who we are, and love us into who we can be. Help us remember that your grace and presence are always with us - even in those shadow places of our lives. Help us reflect your love in our hearts and our lives. In Jesus' name we pray, Amen.
